Narragansett Council Specialty Plates

Thanks to the Rhode Island DMV, if you have a Passenger, Combination, or a Commercial Plate on your vehicle's current registration, you can choose the Narragansett Council specialty plate. It costs a one-time plate fee of \$41.50, with \$20 of that payment going to support Scouting in the Narragansett Council.

Support Scouting by helping us achieve our goal of 600 specialty plates sold in 2019! Specialty plates will not be handed out by the Rhode Island DMV until the required 600 plate minimum per plate type is reached (i.e. 600 passenger must be reached before the DMV will proceed with the passenger printing, 600 combination and so on). We have five years to meet this goal/requirement. If the goal/requirement is not met, your payment of \$41.50 will be refunded in full.

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Who are the members of the CNAA

The Camp Norse Alumni Association was acknowledged by the Narragansett Council Executive board September 2016. Yes, it's been 3 years. The council has supported us financially for these 3 years. Now we're on our own. If my math is correct, and I'm not an accountant, our dues are invested into the Narragansett Council endowment fund and are line item to Camp Norse. This is about \$20,400. We'll receive 5% for our operating budget. In the past this has included postage of the news letter to those without email and postage to recruit new members. Our current project fund is \$5,725. I envision this being used to continue to do projects at Camp Norse including promoting off season use of the property. We've sponsored \$500 staff scholarships for 3 years and are working towards an Eagle Scout Project fund to assist Life Scouts with their project.

So who are the members of our organization? We're 91 strong. This includes 64 Life Members, five 3 year, four 2 year, and nineteen 1 year members. Members are from 11 states most being MA and RI but also 4 from CT, 2 from FL, 1 from LA, 1 From MD, 3 from ME, 2 from NH, 1 from PA, 1 from VA and 1 from VT. I believe we all were, or are, Scouts and Scouters. A few are retired Scouting professionals, and a few are current professionals. We have 3 camp rangers, our current ranger and 2 former Camp Norse Rangers.

Many of our membership are retired and others work in just about every field in the work force.

And as Frank Sinatra said "Start Spreading the Word" In order for the Camp Norse Alumni Association to continue we need more members.

"The safety and protection of children is the most important priority of the Boy Scouts of America." Mike Surbaugh, Chief Scout Executive, Boy Scouts of America.

Part of that commitment includes continually updating our youth protection policies to help ensure we are always on the forefront of youth safety.

As you know, one of the BSA's many barriers to abuse is a mandatory criminal background check during the adult volunteer application process. The BSA will now also perform periodic rechecks of criminal backgrounds to support the continued safety of youth in our programs.

When reregistering this year ALL volunteers must sign an authorization form for a

background check.

WV hosted the 24th World Scout Jamboree

More than 47,000 Scouts and Scouters from 152 countries from around the world experienced the 24th World Scout Jamboree, a World Organization of the Scout Movement event held this year at the Summit Bechtel Reserve (aka The Summit) in West Virginia from July 22 through August 2, 2019. Narragansett Council sent a contingent of 36 Scouts and 4 leader plus many volunteers to work as IST (International Service Team aka Staff) The Scouts had opportunities to try activities they've never experienced before as well as meet Scouts from around the world.

A typical BSA Scout jamboree gives Scouts opportunities to meet Scouts from the US and a few from foreign countries. They have opportunities to work on merit badges, and, of course, patch trading. The World Jamboree focuses instead on cultural exchanges. Scouts learn a new appreciation for Scout values shared globally, like kindness and trustworthiness. And forge understandings living alongside scouts from other countries.

A World Jamboree is often a once in a life time opportunity for most and was a great experience for all that attended.

Now it's onto preparing for the 2021 BSA Jamboree which will also be at the Summit.

When we started off we had a goal of 100 Life members. We're now at 64. If everyone of our members were to reach out to a potential new member maybe we'd move closer to our goal.

Also, keep in mind the alumni is not just about money. It's about spreading the Scouting spirit. It's about Scouting. It's about living the Scout Oath and Law. It's about the comradeship of what we all have in common and that's the values that we believe Scouting brings to the youth of our communities wherever we live. That's one of the messages I learned at the 2019 World Jamboree this summer. Scouting in our communities or around the world has that great common factor and that we belong to the greatest youth program in the world. Our role is to make Camp Norse the greatest camp for all the Scouts and future Scouts to enjoy.

Thank you to all that have made the Camp Norse Alumni Association a success and please spread the word. We need more alumni to be involved to carry out our mission.
